
Prism Quilt—Gelato Jelly Roll

## **Introduction**


While it looks difficult, this quilt is probably the easiest quilt I've ever made—and there are no “Y” seams! To get the effect, you'll need to use 20 different ombre fabrics. I recommend using an ombre jelly roll. The one that I used here is called “Gelato” by Maywood Studio. Mary Ann Makar made this quilt for our 2019 Quilt Show and won a Blue Ribbon!!

## SUPPLY LIST

### Fabric:

- Ombre Jelly Roll (or make your own 40 2 ½" strips of 20 different ombre fabrics)
- Scrap Batting 48" x 48" for design wall
- Border Fabric (if desired)
- 4 yards backing fabric
- 1/2 yard binding fabric

### Tools:

- 60° Triangle Ruler
- Spray Starch
- Sewing machine
- Neutral thread & bobbin
- Straight Pins
- Scissors
- Rotary cutter

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## Pre-Class Instructions:

**PLEASE COMPLETE THE PRE-CLASS WORK**

**PRIOR TO ATTENDING THIS CLASS!**

1. Separate the duplicate strips so you have 2 stacks of 20 completely different ombre strips.
2. Randomly sew together 4 strips.
3. Press seams in 1 direction.
4. Starch and repress. This will help to stabilize your strip sets and minimize stretching of the bias edges
5. Repeat for a total of 10.

**STOP HERE. DO NOT DO ANY CUTTING  
UNTIL WE GET TO CLASS**

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

## Additional Information:

1. The ombre jelly roll that is recommended by the pattern is called One Ombre Strip Roll ST01-0006, but I have not been able to find that one.
2. I used "Gelato" Jelly Roll by Maywood Studios that I found on Amazon and Missouri Star Quilt Co
3. I also found 24 strips called "Ombre Washart Cool" on Etsy and one called "Ombre Flurries Metallic" that are pretty nice.
4. The pattern says that you should be able to make 78 blocks out of the one jelly roll. I was only able to make 70, so I purchased another jelly roll to fill the empty spaces.
5. If you don't want to purchase an extra Jelly Roll, you can cut the size of the quilt to accommodate what you have.
